Why Is Each Year a Different Animal?

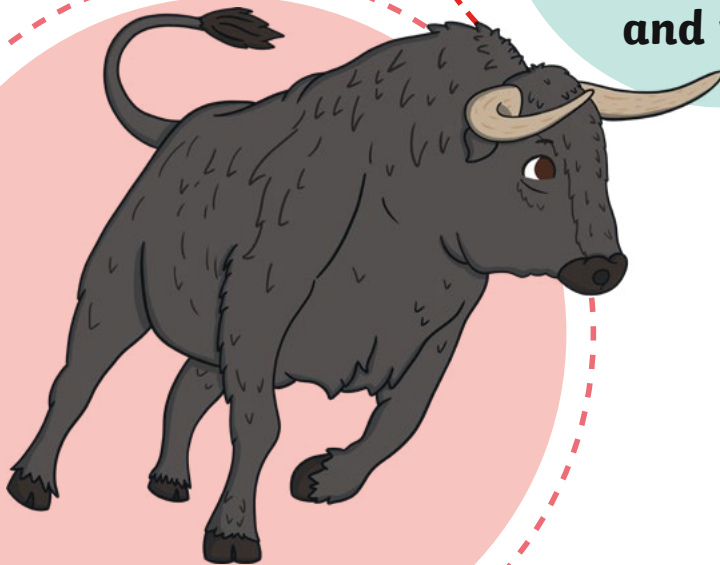
