

Phonics

Digraphs are collections of two letters that make one sound. Examples include; rain, book and seed. A **split digraph** also contains two letters (a-e, e-e, i-e, o-e and u-e) but they are **split** between a consonant, for example; make, bike and pure (at school we usually join the split digraph under the word with a smile line)
