The Possessive Apostrophe

The **possessive** form is used with nouns referring to people, groups of people, countries, and animals. It shows a relationship of belonging between one thing and another.

To form the **possessive**, add **apostrophe + s** to the noun.

e.g. *That is Wilf's coat.* (The coat belongs to Wilf).

If the noun is plural, or already ends in s, just add an **apostrophe** after the s.

Those are James' books. (The books belong to James).
